President's Message

It is with pleasure and enthusiasm that I introduce myself as incoming president of the Veterinary Medical Association of New York City. This chapter of the VMA was started one hundred and twenty-two years ago (1894) by Dr. Thomas Griffen, DVM, and Dr. Rush Huidekoper, DVM, MD, an important figure in the development of veterinary medicine



in America. Though the organization began with much promise, regular meetings suffered from low attendance, so low, in fact, that by 1900, the association was in danger of collapse. Leaders decided to try a different approach. They held "live" meetings in various veterinary hospitals involving live operative and clinical cases, and allowing participants to learn new procedures and techniques. This new kind of meeting reinvigorated the association. The tradition of holding educational meetings has held strong.

Continuing education is, in my opinion, a foundation of any profession. Organized opportunities to learn and grow in our field is a great advantage of belonging to a professional association such as ours! The VMA of NYC strives to provide engaging and accomplished presenters on a variety of topics to satisfy the needs and desires of a large and varied membership (we are currently 314 member strong).

My own involvement with the Association began in 2012, at which time anesthesia-free dentistry had begun to gain popularity. As a veterinary dentist, I was invited to join a Board meeting to discuss this issue. My curiosity and interest in organized veterinary medicine took root there, and I have enjoyed being involved on the Board ever since. This organization provides many ways for both new and seasoned members to become involved, and we are always looking for new perspectives and contributing voices.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has expanded it's Healthy Pets Healthy People website. On it can be found information on the benefits of pet ownership, diseases that can be transmitted between people various animals including pets, farm animals and wildlife. It also offers information on measures people can take to protect themselves and their pets.

The redesigned website offers:

- An alphabetized list and description of diseases that can spread from animals to humans.
- A list of animal species with the description of diseases associated with the animal.
- Specific groups of people that may be more susceptible to diseases from animals.
- Tips for preventing illnesses acquired from pets and other animals.
- Detailed information about the health benefits of owning a pet.

Approximately 75 percent of recently emerging infectious diseases affecting people began as diseases in animals. In recent years, CDC has responded to many illness outbreaks associated with people's contact with animals. These include Ebola, avian influenza, and salmonella.

CDC is officially launching the redesigned website to coincide with World Animal Day on Oct. 4, a day that celebrates the importance of animals and the bonds that people share with them.

"Pets play an important part in many of our lives. The Animal Tales offer a closer look at how animals are positively affecting human lives. As the stories unfold, they provide tips and valuable information on how to protect against diseases that can spread from pets and other animals.

The redesigned website also includes specific precautions that people with weakened immune systems, children, and pregnant women should take when interacting with animals. The content, which is geared toward a broad audience, includes images, little-known facts, and videos.
